CORE LECTURES FOR PRELIMS AND MODS

Mathematics and Philosophy; Physics and Philosophy; Computer Science and Philosophy: Elements of Deductive Logic and General Philosophy

Literae Humaniores: Moral Philosophy or General Philosophy, if either is their chosen option for Mods

A note on locations:

The **Radcliffe Humanities building** (“Rad. Hum.” on the scheme above) has four floors, with lift access to all floors. The rooms chiefly used by Philosophy for classes and lectures are the Ryle Room (1st floor) and the Lecture Room (2nd floor). Other rooms sometimes used are the Colin Matthew Room and Meeting Room 4 (both ground floor) and the Seminar Room (3rd floor). Please check the electronic display board in the lobby to confirm the room before attending.

The **Examination Schools** (“Schools”) is a major site for University lectures. It is found at 75-81 High Street. Electronic screens showing the location of lectures and classes are found in the lobby of the building.
